As the seasons gradually turn again and we head from autumn into winter we are conscious that our field is sometimes very muddy. Please be assured that on the days when the ground is very wet the children whose outside space is the field are restricted to using the daily mile track to try and reduce the risks of getting covered in mud. However, as we are a school that encourages children to make the most of the outdoors, they will inevitably not always come home clean. Forest school is an integral part of our curriculum and the children really enjoy their sessions whatever the weather. We provide all children with waterproof coats and trousers so that they can still access the outdoors. If you are concerned about your child wearing their school uniform either because it may get dirty or because it is not warm enough, then from next week children who are taking part in forest school can come to school Monday - Thursday in old warm clothes instead should their parents wish them too. This is not compulsory but parent choice. Class teachers will email parents to let them know when their child's week is coming up.

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<u>Class R</u>

This week, Class R have finished off their Literacy book 'Owl Babies'. We have talked about how the baby owls felt and done some amazing writing. Talking about feelings continued into SMSC, and the children read the story 'The Colour Monster' by Anna Llenas. The children created their own colour monsters based on their emotions and we talked about ways to help with different emotions for example; talking to a close friend or adult if we feel sad. Why not ask you child about their colour monster? In Maths, we started to learn about parts and wholes - what is a whole and what is a part. We also have moved onto learning about the number 4. In Phonics, we have learnt the sounds; ch, x & qu, and the red words; to and you.

<u>Class 1</u>


This week we have been learning our number bonds to 10 and 20. We have used bead strings to help us with this. In English we have started a new class text- Lost and Found. We have read the first few pages and made some predictions about where the penguin might have come from and what the boy might have been thinking. In Theme we have been learning about the seasons in the Arctic. We learnt that Winter is six months long and Summer is only 3 months. We compared the Arctic Winter and Summer by sorting pictures from these times of year.

<u>Class 2</u>

This week we have been learning about time. We practised o'clock, halfpast and learned quarter to and quarter past. We have also been looking at line symmetry in 2D shapes and working practically. In our writing we have used our story 'Don't hog the hedge' to help us with descriptive writing, we also retold part of the story trying to change some of the characters. We also investigated using exclamation sentences in our work. In PE we worked hard on different fitness circuits including tuck jumps, high knees, line jumps and sprints.




<u>Class 3</u>

This week we have planned and written an alternative story based around Cinderella and our class text 'Egyptian Cinderella'. We used Mrs Ryan as our Cinderella character who eventually got to the Christmas party when the cleaning fairy arrived. We have also been learning how to use 'a and an' before words. In maths, we have been reading writing, ordering and comparing numbers to 1000 and have moved on to perimeter. We have continued our Egyptian pattern work in art and in ICT our robots are coming on nicely! Half the class have enjoyed Forest school this week whilst the others have been busy with science, cornet and RE and this will swap next week.

Class 4

We have had great fun in English this week writing our Cinderella stories. After a week and a half of planning, we have spent 4 days writing our books (seven paragraphs in total) and we spent Friday's lesson designing the front cover. In maths we have looked at bar graphs and time graphs this week and learnt how to interpret them. We even designed our own bar graphs by asking the class some questions. In theme we got very wet and muddy making Egyptian bricks by combing mud and straw. We stamped it down and then placed the mixture in a brick-shaped carton to dry. In science we looked at the functions of the digestive system...can you remember all 14 parts?

This week in English we have been working hard on analysing a text' looking for good features that we should be including in our writing; including the use of semi colons. The children have then worked extremely hard on writing and independent piece of writing to describe the picture we have been focusing on over the past week. In Maths we have been looking at how we use mental strategies and have had a go at using these to answer a range of problems. The children have all shown great resilience doing this. In Theme, we have researched rationing and produced an information poster in ICT to display our findings.

Class 5

<u>Class 6</u>

In maths this week, we have spent time working on our problem-solving skills; in particular, working backwards. This is where we are given the answer to a question and the operations to get there. We have had to find the inverse operation before solving the problem. We have also been working on factors, multiples and prime numbers and

finding common factors and multiples and representing our findings in Venn and Carroll diagrams. In English, we have continued studying the book, The Arrival. We have been adding speech to an image based on what we could 'see'. We have the. Used an imaged an image to write our own description. We have had to include lots of features and had to up-level our vocabulary. In theme, our resilience skills have been put to the test in making model spitfires and Lancaster bombers.

Christmas Cards

This year we are going to have to do Christmas cards a bit differently ... Should children want to bring in christmas cards for their friends, they can only bring cards for others in their own class. Please do not bring cards for anyone outside of their class

Children should bring cards in on either a Monday or a Thursday. On a Monday, the class teacher will ask the child to put their cards into a designated bag where they will stay in guarantine until Thursday, when they will be given out by the teacher.
