Class R

We have finished off our *Cinderella* focus this week by creating some amazing crowns. We then read the story of *Little Red Riding Hood.* We talked about how some of the versions are different. We then practiced our fine motor skills by cutting and sticking some pictures to order the story. We also thought about what could be in Little Red Riding Hood's basket.

In maths our focus has shifted to the numbers 6, 7 and 8. We saw how these numbers could be represented in different ways and then we sorted pictures into piles. We also played a really fun pairs game with matching numbers and dot cards. On Friday we played another game with beanbags and a bucket to understand the composition of a number (for example, 8 can be made up of 5 and 3).

We finished off the week by watching a Little Red Riding Hood ballet and tried to join in with some of the actions.

Class 1

This week in English we began our retelling of the Beegu story. We used picture prompts to help us remember the order of events and we have tried to include a time adverbial at the start of our sentences and use conjunctions such as 'and', 'but' and 'because' to add detail to our sentences.

In Maths we have continued our work on addition and subtraction focusing on subtraction this week. We have used known facts to help us complete subtractions where there are just 10 more. We noticed that if we know 7-3=4 we also know 17-3=14. We have also completed subtractions using a number line and looked at finding the difference between two numbers. In Science this week we learnt about how a telephone works. We found out that when the caller speaks into a telephone, the microphone changes the sound of the person's voice into an electric signal. The base sends out the signal through its wire. We tested this out by making some string telephones and had fun using them on the playground. In art we painted our clay cartouches in gold and chose a bright colour for the base. We will add colour to the hieroglyphics when

We didn't manage PE due to the heavy snow and lots of us going home early but we did enjoy some exercise in class using just dance.

Class 2

In English this week we have been writing descriptive noun phrases for Wolfie. We also prepared some items for a class display. We were excited to use our special handwriting pens for writing best copies of our letters to Wolfie. We also finished some lovely pictures and illustrations. We worked a little more on suffixes and how they are used to improve our writing. In Maths we continued our work with data and statistics interpreting tally charts, pictograms and bar charts but using our knowledge of 2's, 5's and 10's. We finished our theme of Communication: Then and Now by learning about the post office and following a letter from being written, to arriving at someone's home. We really enjoyed learning about the start of the internet and the world wide web and Tim Berners Lee who developed it. Thanks to the snow we had some time with our carpet toys and jigsaws, as some children had left school early. We worked cooperatively together and produced some lovely lego models. We sent our trains on an interesting journey along the wooden train track. We worked together to add trees, bridges, signals and even a mountain to the route. It was fun!




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Class 3

This week, Class 3 have been writing a diary entry from the perspective of a Roman soldier. We have researched facts to include in our entries and included feelings and opinions. We used our writing features and wrote in the first person and past tense.

In theme, we looked at Boudicca's rebellion and wrote WANTED posters to help capture her.

In maths, we have been learning how to use flexible partitioning in division, looking for multiples, and have also looked at scaling up, using our multiplications. We finished the week in maths with reasoning questions, using multiplication to help find combinations to problems. In science, we looked at 'silly shadows' identifying why they were incorrect and what they should be.

We enjoyed our last session of rugby with Ciara and developed our programming skills further in Computing, using Scratch. It was good fun writing programs to change the sprite's costume and background!

Class 4

This week, Class 4 have finished off our unit on Multiplication and Division by looking at correspondence problems and different ways to multiply which we can use to efficiently solve multiplication problems.

Our next unit is length and perimeter which the children are feeling confident about. In English, we have planned and written a Diary entry, imagining we are Roman soldiers. The children learnt about the Roman army and were shocked that soldiers had to stay in the army for 25 years!! The children also had to paint the Roman Eagle used on the shields and by the Eagle bearers. In computing, we learnt about procedures and how we can use our algorithms as a set of instructions.

In PE, we have continued with our football skills.

Science was the children's favourite activity this week. We did an investigation into the digestive system and the children had different body roles e.g. mouth, stomach etc. and we replicated the body eating food and converting it to poo. At the end, the children agreed the human body was gross.

Class 5

This week in Maths class 5 have been finding fractions of amounts. In English we have been writing our own Greek myths ensuring that we are including writing features such as parenthesis, relative clauses and fronted adverbials. In theme we investigated the difference between Athens and Sparta, we looked at how education differed and what was expected of men and women in each city state. In PE we have continued to develop our yoga routines and learned some new poses. At the beginning of the week we performed our interpretation of the "firebird" at Saddleworth school.

Class 6

This week in English we have been writing our own myths based around characters and mythical creatures we have previously read about. We have been focusing on many writing features as well as trying to make the myths as authentic as possible. In maths we have continued with our algebra topic where we have been learning to form, and then solve, equations that have used letters to represent certain numbers. In SMSC we have also looked at what 'good value' means and how retailers try to make the offers look better than they sometimes are. We also enjoyed a sports session taught by Saddleworth Year 10 sports leaders where we had a go at some football, netball, dodgeball and dance lessons that the sports leaders had designed.


Our first shout out goes to Leo in Class 2. Leo has achieved his 5m backstroke swimming badge. Well done Leo. Keep up the good work!

There is still time to enter this fantastic competition. All entries must be submitted by 29 February 2024.






