<u>Class R</u>

Class R have continued with our topic 'Celebrations' by looking celebrations we all share such as weddings, funerals and anniversaries. Our word of the week was 'Traditions' and we looked at different wedding traditions around the world, such as Henna painting and hiding the grooms shoes. The children really enjoyed role playing some of the different traditions and using the globe to see where each country was. The children also learnt the story 'The Scarecrow's Wedding', by Julia Donaldson. They designed their own wedding dresses, made lists of things they would need for a wedding and even wrote some stories where their characters got married.

This week was Road safety week. The children did a variety of activities around how to be safe on the roads. In PE the children developed their special awareness and practiced travelling in space and avoiding obstacles by pretending to be cars. On Friday, we met up with our year 6 buddies and talked about how to cross roads safely. We practiced crossing the playground, before using our knowledge on Sam Road, outside the school.

In Maths, the children looked at representations of the number 3 and consolidated everything we have learnt about 1,2 & 3. The children read the traditional tale 'The Three Billy Goats Gruff' and played a game where they had to roll a special dice to get across the parachute before the troll spotted them. They also looked at Part, Part, whole models and timelines to help them understand 3 is 1 more than 2 and 3 is made is 2 and 1.

Lastly, we took part in the school council elections. The children bravely stood up and were supported by Mrs Bradbury to tell the class why they should be chosen. We then voted and used tally marks to count. Even though some of us were disappointed we clapped our friends. Well done Class R!!

<u>Class 1</u>

This week in English we have read the first few pages of our class text Lost and Found. We have written our thoughts about where the penguin came from and why he knocked on the boy's door. We have discussed why the boy thought the penguin was lost and then wrote words to describe how the penguin might be feeling. We talked about who the boy asked for help and why he asked those characters. We then wrote our ideas about why he asked each one. In maths we have been continuing our work on subtraction. We have looked at different ways of finding the answer to a subtraction calculation including counting how many are left, crossing out on a picture and using a number line to count backwards. We also practised adding and subtracting one and two from a number. In Science we learnt about our sense of taste. We identified the different parts of the mouth and talked about the four tastes our taste buds can detect. We tasted foods to try and decide whether each was sweet, sour, salty or bitter. In Theme we learnt more about the Antarctic and wrote a fact file using what we had learnt. In our Monday PE we are learning some Gymnastics skills and we practising spinning on different parts of our body such as our tummy, back or bottom and practised different types of balances. We then worked on linking these different movements to form a short sequence.

<u>Class 2</u>

In our English work this week we have been learning how to use the conjunctions **and**, **but**, **or** to make two shorter sentences into a longer, more interesting one. We re-read the story of 'Ten Little Lights' and used some of the descriptive vocabulary from the story in our sentences as well. We also continued to work on noun phrases. In Maths we have been adding and subtracting crossing the tens. We have used counters practically and begun to partition numbers to help us subtract on a number line. We have counted past 100 and in sequences. We have begun a new theme this week called 'Winter Wonderland'. We used atlases and a globe to investigate the continents and oceans. We also learned about the difference between climate and weather. We discovered that where we live has a temperate or warm climate which means we have 4 seasons. We learned the months of the year and which months are in each season. We chose our favourite season and drew pictures labelled with noun phrases, we learned a seasons song, danced to the months of the year song and found out which month we all have a birthday in. Phew! Finally we used the i-pads to investigate hot, cold and temperate climates and the animals we find there, the food that grows there and what clothes we would need if we travelled there.



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<u>Class 3</u>

This week in theme, Class 3 have looked at the Journey to the Afterlife and the Ancient Egyptians' beliefs of the Underworld. We looked at the god Amit (the Devourer) and used this inspiration, and the book Gorgeous, to write our own version of the book. We linked this to our SPAG work on apostrophes for possession. We have also been busy learning our spellings. We have been subtracting 10s and exchanging hundreds in maths using Base 10 representation and number lines. In science, we have been investigating opaque/transparent and translucent materials and using this to inform our work on shadows.

Class 4

Class 4 have been hard at work writing up their amazing Cinderella stories this week. In maths we have moved on to multiplying and dividing by 10 and 100. In SMSC we created a storyboard to explain some coping mechanisms when faced with difficult situations and in science we looked at the types and functions of teeth. We have explored what the internet is in computing and we worked with partners in PE to create a paired Egyptian dance.

<u>Class 5</u>

This week Year 5 have been working on multiplication in maths. We looked at factors and multiples and explored how we can identify multiples of different numbers . The words "digital root" were much used. In English we have continued with our work on The Nowhere Emporium and have written our own descriptions of our Wonder Rooms for a version of our own Book of Wonder. We also have spent time outside when the weather allowed to brandish our posters about safe parking outside school. Lastly well done to all those who took part in our elections for school council.

<u>Class 6</u>

In Theme this week Class 6 have looked at rationing and have used the potatoes harvested from the school garden to cook corned beef hash. Another group followed a recipe for shortbread biscuits and all of the children had the opportunity to try the food they had produced. There was even enough corned beef hash for some of the teachers to take for their tea! The children washed, peeled, measured and chopped all of the ingredients by themselves. In Maths this week the children have been ordering and comparing fractions by changing the denominator so that if the same. We have also had a look a representing fractions using the bar model. In English the children have continued to read 'The Nowhere Emporium' and have created writing inspired by the book; the children have created their own wonder room that could exist in the Emporium by writing their own entry for Mr Silver's book.

Now the weather is turning cold, please can we remind parents not to sit in their cars with the engine running when parked on the roadside. Idling creates a hot-spot of concentrated emissions which the passing children are then

The Highway Code states: "You must not leave a vehicle's engine running unnecessarily while that vehicle is stationary on a public road."
