Class R

This week Class R have written a message in a bottle to the Pirates who left us a treasure map and note. We thought hard about what we wanted to let them know, how we felt during and after the treasure hunt and what we had to do! We used the paper we previously stained with tea bags and used elastic bands to roll them up and tie them. In Phonics, we have learnt sounds 'aw' 'are' and 'ur', as well as red words 'what' 'want' and 'so'.

In Maths, we have been focusing on doubling and started to introduce halving and sharing. We made cakes with plasticine and held a picnic with our friends. We had to make sure we shared the cakes out evenly so it was fair!

In PE, we practiced our running, jumping and side skipping. We were in teams of 5 and it got really competitive!

We also had carpet time to discuss our new class. We discussed how we were feeling, what we might be a little bit worried about and then thought of some questions we wanted to ask our new Teacher, we wrote these down and passed them on. This week the children have loved their transition days in Class 1 and seem very excited for their next adventure!

Class 1

This week in English we took inspiration from the Diary of a Wombat to plan and write our own diary from the point of view of a pet. Some of us chose dogs, some cats, even chickens! We used the days of the week and words to describe the time of the day to structure our writing. We also used a colon to signal the start of a list. In maths we have been revisiting money. We looked again at the value of coins and looked at different ways of making a total amount. We played the toy shop money game on the ipads where we chose suitable coins to make the price of each toy. In Science this week we looked at the parts of a plant. We named and labelled the roots, stem, leaves and flower on a diagram of a plant. In Theme this week we have learnt about the weather and climate in two different parts of Australia. We learnt that Darwin in the Northern Territory has a tropical climate with a wet and dry season. It gets very hot and dry in summer but wetter and stormier in the winter. Hobart in Tasmania is in the south of Australia and has a cooler climate, warm in summer but cold in winter, it even gets some snow! We completed a cutting and sticking activity to choose weather words for each place then we drew a picture showing the different weather in the two places. We had a fantastic two days in Class 2 and came back full of excitement for September.

Class 2

This week our in science learning we reviewed the results of our fair test. We have been growing seeds under different conditions to see how they grow and if they grow well. There was some great discussion around the results with some fantastic scientific vocabulary used too.

We have also worked on internet safety this week. We found out that the information we put online leaves a digital footprint and we learned how to recognise whether a website is appropriate for children.

Our school reports will be ready soon so we have written our comments this week, ready to add to them. We thought hard about what we had enjoyed, what we had done well and what we may need to work on in Year 3. It was fun remembering all the things we had done this year.

We also had a super time on our two transition days when we spent time working in Year 3. We all enjoyed the activities we did around dragons!











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Class 3

Class 3 have enjoyed finishing their bubbles from The BFG in oil pastels and been word detectives finding verbs, adverbs and nouns within a chapter. We also thought about definitions of words in context. In maths, we have assessed learning and had fun whilst learning on Defenders of Mathematica, TTRockstars and Maths Whizz at the end of the week. In cricket, we improved our bowling and batting skills with new games. The children all came back buzzing with enthusiasm and tales of activities they have done on their Transition days and sound like they'd had a lovely time.


Class 4

Class 4 had great fun in science this week. We revisited how instruments can produce a different pitch of sound. We then had a go at making our own set of panpipes using straws and lolly sticks. They worked! In SMSC we looked at how puberty can affect people's emotions. We then made a handy leaflet to explain why this happens and to offer advice. On Monday we completed the big spelling test for the last time and lots of children made improvements. Not to mention the two days of transition into class 5 with Mrs Hazlehurst! All round, another great week.

Class 3 have been using the oil pastels to blend colours when creating these bubbles inspired by the chapter 'Mixing the Dream ' from The BFG.











Class 5

In maths this week, we have been converting between different units of measure. We recapped converting grams to kilograms etc before moving on to conversions between metric and imperial measurements. We spent two days in the Year 6 classroom which made us feel very grown up especially being the oldest in the school. We wrote letters to our buddies who we will be looking after in september. We also thought about our aspirations for Year 6 and what we hope to achieve next year. In theme, we completed some research on the Mayan gods and then created our own god. In PE this week, we practiced our tennis skills playing different games to perfect our techniques.

Class 6

This week in class 6 we have been spending lots of time practising for our production and have been busy making props for this too. We have also been very lucky to have had help off Mr Ryan this week who has helped us with the amazing transformation of the memorial garden. It isn't quite finished, but it is looking so much better and we are really proud with how it looks already. We have also had 2 transition days to Saddleworth School this week where we have had the chance to find our way around the school and meet some of the teachers.


































Notices

Parent Pay

Please check your balances, and clear any outstanding items. We are carrying quite a bit of debt at the moment both in BASC fees and dinner money. We will have to ask children go onto packed lunches and stop using the BASC service for continued unpaid debts in these areas.

Parents in Year 6/ leavers - please look to make sure all debts are paid before the end of term, and cancel your auto-topup on your school dinner account, if you have one. Once school has finished, any credit balances will be returned to you transferred to a sibling account and debts will be chased / transferred to sibling accounts.

Names in clothing

As the weather improves, the children are discarding their coats, jumpers and cardigans, especially when playing outside. If your child's name is not in their clothing, we cannot return it to them. Please make sure all coats, jumpers and cardigans have your child's name in them.
