<u>Class R</u>

This week Class R have been learning the traditional tale 'Goldilocks & the Three Bears'. The children have learnt story actions to retell the story and had a go drawing their own story maps. We also made some three bears porridge by following a recipe. Once it was cooked, the children had 4 toppings to choose from; jam, berries, banana & honey. All the children tried some porridge and then if they liked porridge they added toppings. As they chose, we looked at healthy eating and talked about how oats have the superpower to give us energy all day. The children then wrote about making the porridge and decided if their topping was the healthiest from the choices. They all agreed bears would really like honey on their porridge! The children also enjoyed role playing in our Once upon a time estate agents and made sure all the houses they sold had locks! Mrs Bradbury asked the children whether Goldilocks was a good character. This question split the class and we had some really interesting points, but when we looked at our 6Rs the children all believed that Goldilocks didn't make good choices.

In Maths, we have been looking at the number 5 and all the different ways we could make 5. We tried to share 5 pieces of birthday cake our between the 3 bears from the story and found we couldn't share it equally. We also had a look at ordinal numbers and comparing sizes of objects from the story e.g. tall, medium and small chairs.

Finally, in PE we were looking at games that help us move and stop. The children were practicing moving and stopping different parts of their bodies.

<u>Class 1</u>

This week in English we started our new class text "Beegu". We started with an interesting discovery on the school playground when we found debris from what looked like a spaceship crash! We shared lots of ideas about what might have happened and then looked at the similarities with the first page of the the book. We wrote predictions about what Beegu might do next. We discussed what Beegu thought that nobody could understand her and made a list of the sounds she could hear coming from the city. We completed a prediction track using of our ideas based on what had happened so far. In Maths this week we have been working on place value within 20. We have practised counting forwards and backwards from any starting point within 20. We have looked at the structure of the teen numbers, checking how many tens and ones are in each teen number. In Science we looked for signs of winter. We didn't have to look very far- we spotted ice, snow, bare trees and berries. In Theme we have been learning about Louis Braille and the writing system he invented to help visually impaired people like himself. We had a go at using the Braille code of dots to write some words.

<u>Class 2</u>

In writing this week we have been doing lots of different things in our writing rotation. We learned how to use apostrophes for possession such as Mrs Rawson's cup, Miss Spivey's coat and practised with different items belonging to each other. We solved 'picture sums' to identify and spell compound words and practised our key spellings. Finally we wrote our news. In Maths we have been exploring shape. We recapped the names of 2D shapes by counting their sides to help us remember. We learned what vertex and vertices are and counted vertices on some unusual shapes. We practised drawing different 2D shapes using reasoning to follow clues. We continued our science theme 'Everyday materials' looking at brick, stone and paper. We investigated their properties and what they are used for. We designed our own brick pattern for a strong wall and tested the strength of different shaped paper columns. We discovered the cylindrical paper column was the strongest and held 80 reading books! We then made

3D paper sculptures by folding, weaving, bending, twisting, weaving, curling.....We found so many ways to change the shape of a paper strip.



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<u>Class 3</u>

This week we were excited to start our new book 'The StrangeWorlds Travel Agency'. We looked at vocabulary and descriptions by the author. In theme, we learnt about Spain; plotting features in Geography, learning about the artist Antoni Gaudi and research paella before designing our own. In maths we have been learning about arrays, sharing and grouping in our multiplication and division unit. We have recapped our french learning from the past few weeks, putting our learning into a short conversation.

Class 4

We have continued our *States of Matter* unit by studying Joseph Priestley. We looked at gases, discovered that they have weight, and learnt that the bubbles in fizzy drinks are carbon dioxide. In theme our focus this week was Spain. We plotted points on a map, looked at the work of Antoni Gaudi, and made paella recipes. Apostrophes were on the menu in English. We learnt about contractions, and then went on to look at how they are used to show possession. The swimming was great fun again on Thursday, and we made progress in SMSC were we learnt about what activities affected our minds, bodies, and hearts in both a positive and negative way.

<u>Class 5</u>

This week we have continued our work on Shackleton's Journey. We finished and edited our letters of application writing them and signing them as members of the crew. We did have to invent some details though. As part of our comprehension we looked at the layout of William Grill's book on Shackleton. We have also researched the physical geography of the Antarctic and located different features on a map. In mathematics we have continued our work infractions and are really gaining confidence here. We also really enjoyed our P.E. trip to Saddleworth School!

<u>Class 6</u>

This week in English we have written our letters as crew men to join the Endurance Expedition, thinking carefully about the skills and experience our particular crew member would have that they could bring the this once in a lifetime opportunity. We have started our new Science topic; focusing on the circulatory system, looking specifically at the heart. In Maths we have been focusing on converting metric units of measure trying to think about the units for conversion for length, mass and capacity. In PE we have carried on with. In PE we have continued to focus on improving our fitness and set up different stations to measure how many we could do in 1 minute. We also started to use the boxercise equipment to improve our fitness which we will build on and develop over the next few weeks. The children also enjoyed taking part in a PE session ran by the some sports leaders at Saddleworth School earlier this week, where they took part in either a football, dodgeball or dance session.








<u>CITC- City vs Girona</u>

FODS Used Uniform Sale


