Class R

This week Class R have been discussing the story 'The Hungry Caterpillar'. We have been acting out the lifecycle of a butterfly and putting the stages in order. We have also been sharing our favourite foods, both healthy and unhealthy, just like the caterpillar. We have been super creative this week and made a caterpillar out of lampshades for the classroom and our own mini caterpillars on leaves. In Maths, we have been learning about our new key words 'short' and 'long', we compared the lengths of caterpillars and moved our learning on by measuring how long items were with our steps. In Phonics, we have learnt new sounds and focused on red words 'l' 'the' and 'to'. In RE, we have been learning why Jesus is special and read the story 'Jesus calms the storm.' We used musical instruments to act out the sounds of the storm and compared this to the noises you might have heard when he calmed the storm. In PE, we pretended to be in a Chocolate Factory, practicing our running skills, organising the different coloured objects into the correct hoop.

This week Class R have focused on a new word of the week, 'enormous'. We read the story 'The Enormous Turnip' and then practiced writing our name on enormous paper with enormous letters!

<u>Class 1</u>

This week in English we have continued to read our class story 'Beegu'. We have written thought bubbles and speech bubbles for Beegu and the children at the school. We have made predictions about what the teacher might do with Beegu and role played the conversation between Beegu and the teacher. In Maths we have been learning about weight. We have completed a carousel

of weighing activities across the week including estimating and checking which objects are heavier/lighter, estimating and checking how many cubes will be of equal weight to different objects, using trial and error to find out the approximate weight of objects in grams and estimating lightest to heaviest in our group and weighing ourselves in kilograms. In Theme we learnt about the role of carrier pigeons to send communications during WW1. We wrote our own messages and used tea staining to make them look old. In art we began painting our salt dough cartouches.

Class 2

This week Class 2 have been using our class book looking more carefully at the cheeky aliens Bob found on the moon. We designed and painted our own aliens and made up some super descriptive sentences using noun phrases. We gave our aliens phonic names and wrote short narratives about them, what they look like, where they live, what they like to do and the type of characters they are. Our phonics this week has focussed on words with the ge and dge spelling pattern which make the 'j' sound. We found some great words too, our favourites were dungeon and gorgeous. We even

found the pattern in two of our names, Paige and George! In maths work this week we have been using empty number lines for subtraction and learning how to subtract ten from a two digit number and how we represent this using the empty number line. We have been using our 'rekenreks' to help learn more about 'more than' and 'fewer than' and making up our own number sentences. In PE this week we have been working on using the warm up to effectively prepare for exercise and then working on some yoga poses through story and movement. We enjoyed the calm down cool down time at the end of the lesson!

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Class 3

This week Class 3 have been looking at how the author uses language to create effect and give the reader an image in their head. In maths, we have been learning to find fractions of shapes and amounts. We have learnt what a unit fraction and non-unit fraction is. In science, we have been learning the properties transparent, translucent and opaque and finding examples of these in the classroom. We tested our shadow knowledge with a 'Silly shadow' worksheet. In ICT we have further developed our emailing skills on Purple Mash and enjoyed a Scavenger HUnt in games when we had to use the maps again and build on our previous lesson. We enjoyed our French lesson, learning how to use our knowledge of numbers to ask and answer 'How old are you?'

Class 4

Class 4 have continued with fractions, only this week we have been adding and subtracting them. By the end of the week, we were adding and subtracting large fractions that were more than 1 whole. In theme we looked again at the spread of the Roman Empire. We used atlases and compass directions to plot where the soldiers would have visited. We also compared the names of countries then and now. In SMSC we have focussed on some good sleeping habits and in PE we continued our football dribbling skills. Comprehension was the focus in English this week and in science we planned and carried out an experiment which involved melting chocolate. The best bit...we ate the evidence afterwards!

Class 5

This week in in Maths we have been looking at the short division method, for some of us this has been particularly tricky but all the class have shown great resilience; whether that was working thoroughly through the method or answering more difficult reasoning questions. In English we have started to think about creating our own myth by creating our own mythical creature and thinking carefully about the distinctive features they might have and up-levelling our work through our vocabulary choices. In Theme we have learnt about the different sports within the Olympic games and that they originated in Ancient Greece in 776BC, we have also looked at democracy and how the Greeks used it to make decisions, comparing this to how we use democracy today.

Class 6

This week we have been talking about mental health with Leon from CITC. We talked about signs of mental illness and looked at what to do if you are scared. In English we read the Ancient Greek myth Medusa. We started to write a newspaper report about the story. In Maths we calculated the volume of cuboids. In Theme we wrote a fact file for Greek Gods and wrote a balanced argument for

2 ancient greek states, Athens and Sparta, how they used democracy and oligarchy. In science, as our topic is evolution and inheritance, we researched the evolution of a chicken, horse and human. On friday, in PE we practiced our batting techniques and bowling with Kiara from CITC. We had a great time with the fun activities.

Parent Pay

Please make sure your Dinner Money is up to date. Please consider using the auto top-up function in Parent Pay - this enables you to set an automatic payment of an amount you set to be triggered when the account balance gets to a specific point, meaning you don't get in debt. For example, you can choose to set it to pay £20 when the account balance goes below £1. It does this by direct debit and is simple to set-up. Music fees for Autumn and Spring should now be paid up, leaving just the Summer term owing at most. If you pay your BASC fees by Childcare Voucher, Parent Pay is now back up to date - apologies for the delay. Please check your Parent Pay account to make sure your voucher payments are appropriate and adjust accordingly. If you pay your BASC fees

direct on Parent Pay, please make sure your BASC account is kept in credit. If you pay your BASC fees via the Tax Free Childcare scheme, all January payments will be updated on Parent Pay on Monday.

New School Telephone Number

From April we will have a new phone number at school. Until the end of March, the existing phone number will continue to work, however the new number is also in operation now, (diverting to the current number for now).

A parent and Diggle resident has kindly shared with us a letter received by some residents this week regarding forthcoming road closure which will affect parents who drive in and out of Diggle.

Huddersfield Road will again be closed in BOTH DIRECTIONS from the entrance to Diggle from Standege Road to the Chippy. The diversion into Diggle is up the A62 towards Marsden and back down Huddersfield Road, the same as before, and the reverse to leave Diggle. The planned date for this work is **06.00 Monday 14th Feb - 23.59 Sunday 20th Feb**

However it does state the work is weather and temperature dependent, so could change at the last minute.

The letter also states these are the final works required relating to the school development..

PLEASE NOTE that when the road was completely closed last time, traffic marshalls were stationed on Spurn Lane to ensure it is used for resident access only. We recommend that if you need to arrive or leave Diggle by car, you leave plenty of time and use the requested diversion rather than trying to use the back lanes, from which you may be turned away.

We appreciate this is an inconvenience however the new school is due to open after half term and we can therefore put these road closures behind us for good!.
