Class R

We have started our new unit on 'celebrations' this week by focusing on Halloween and Bonfire Night. We have read the books Funnybones, Pumpkin Soup, The Giant Pumpkin and Room on the Broom and watched a few videos about Guy Fawkes and the Gunpowder Plot. We also talked about how to stay safe with fireworks.

Our reading and writing rotation started properly this week and the children have settled into their groups. The children read one day, write the next, go over phonics another and practice their fine motor skills on the last day. In phonics the children learned how to say and write the sounds f, e, I and h.

In maths the children have learned to find, subitise and represent the numbers 1, 2 and 3.

We also made some delicious pumpkin soup this week. The children followed the recipe to chop, sprinkle, blend and stir the tasty soup. We then got to eat it the day after.

We also created some firework artwork, made some bonfire chocolate breadsticks and stashed our bird food kebabs in the forest for the wildlife to eat.

Class 1

This week in English we have started a new book called Lost and Found by Oliver Jeffers. We have read the first few pages and wrote in sentences to answer questions about where the penguin might have come from and why he knocked on the boy's door. We also considered what the boy was thinking when he saw a penguin on his doorstep. We wrote sentences with our ideas.

In Maths we have been continuing our work on addition and subtraction. We have learnt how to use subtraction to find a missing part, how to use a part whole model to write out a fact family and how to rearrange number sentences accurately. In Science we went on a walk around the school grounds to look for signs of Autumn. We spotted lots of clues such as the different coloured leaves, pine cones, mushrooms, fallen leaves, conkers and conker husks.

In Theme we started our new theme Winter in the Arctic. We looked at a video explaining the hot and cold parts of the earth and then looked at a globe to locate these. We then shaded a word map to show the hot, warm and cold zones. We labelled the North and South Pole and the Equator.

Class 2

This week in Maths we have been using equipment to find the relationships between pairs of numbers which together make 10 and pairs of numbers which together make 100. In writing we started a new book called The Storm Whale by Benji Davies. We read the 'blurb' on the back cover and thought it would be a good book. We then found adjectives to help us write a short description about a whale. In design technology we are very proud of our photograph frames which we designed and made with a stand so that they stand up.

In Information Technology we have started a new topic about digital photography. We learnt which devices are able to take photographs and then used ipads to take photographs. We found out that we need to hold the ipad still so that the photograph isn't blurred and that some pictures are better taken in portrait and others in landscape.

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Class 3

This week, Class 3 investigated magnets as the first lesson on their Magnets and Forces unit in Science. We have started our new theme 'Stone Age to Iron Age', looking at characters, then writing a description of Om from the book 'Stone Age Boy'. In Maths, we have been subtracting 1s and 10s crossing over the columns and using number lines or Base 10. We enjoyed our first basketball session applying learning from our football and adapting it for basketball. We then linked it to our compass work in geography and dribbled the ball to different compass points. In art, we have used chalks and pastels to draw animals from the Stone Age.

Class 4

At the beginning of the week we finished our previous topic by discussing the question "why do people live in places with natural disasters?" Later on in the week, we moved onto our new topic 'The Stone Age' and created a timeline. We also moved onto our Stone Age inspired book in English - Stone Age Boy by Satoshi Kitamura. We discussed what we liked and didn't like about the story and wrote a directed speech script in our books for the main characters first meeting.

In Maths, we have been learning about subtracting 4 digit numbers and looking at how to exchange numbers in order to reason the answers. The children did this with counters before trying different written ways to subtract with exchanges.

We had a Halloween inspired day in French, when we created our own monsters. The children then wrote sentence describing their monsters e.g. Il a une tête violet. The children also really enjoyed having a go at orienteering in PE. We looked at compasses and the children enjoyed trying to find all the animals Mr West had hidden around the school.

Class 5

In Class 5 we have started to learn about the Titanic. We have created a non-chronological report to inform other people about the Titanic and what happened to it. In Maths we have been looking at multiplying and dividing by 10, 100 and 1,000 we have worked really hard to make sure that we are reading the questions accurately. We have also started to look at our new topic in Theme which is the Victorians, we discussed what the children already knew about the Victorians and also what we would like to find out more about. Our new topic in Science is forces. We talked about gravity and looked at the forces that are involved in the flight of an aeroplane.

Class 6

This week in English Class 6 have started to learn about the Titanic and have created non-chronological reports for others who do not know about the Titanic to give them a basic understanding of why the ship is so famous and what happened to it. In Maths we have been working hard on learning the long division method. The children have been practising the method and what to do and have really made some great progress with this. We have also focused on Science this week and completed out living things and their habitats topic by learning about the different groups of animals and how they can be described based on their characteristics and also learnt about microorganisms and investigating which surface in school we believe to be the best place to start growing mould and have used bread to investigate this (experiment is still ongoing).










Class 1 designed and made a healthy sandwich. We drew our sandwich and labelled the ingredients we were going to use. We then learnt about food hygiene and selected our ingredients to prepare our sandwiches and wraps.





Class 3 designed and made waving posters based on a Halloween theme. It was great fun!

They then evaluated their designs to say what they were pleased with or things they might improve in future.







Year 5 and 6 created Halloween themed felt phone cases. First they discussed ideas in groups and then created their designs on paper. After this they were given the felt sides but then the children did everything else. They learnt how to sew the sides together using a blanket stitch and then cut out other materials to decorate them - some children even chose to stitch their materials on rather than sticking them with glue. Once we returned this week we made any final changes and also evaluated our products; thinking carefully about what worked well and how they could improve things if they were given the opportunity to do them again.




Something's (Still) Cooking at Diggle School

School Meals

The menu for school dinners is on the school website - https://www.diggleschool.co.uk/school-meals

The amazing kitchen staff provide a wide range of tasty meals throughout the week, with 3 options to choose from most days, and all dietary requirements will be catered for.

Meals are charged at £2.60 for years 3-6 unless eligible for Free School Meals. If you pay for your child's dinners the easiest way to make sure you don't fall behind with payments is to set up the "Auto Top-Up", which automatically adds an amount set by you when the balance drops below a certain amount.

If your child doesn't usually have school meals and wants to try, they just need to order on the day. We are very flexible regarding children mixing school dinners and packed lunches if there are certain days they like the menu choice and not others.

Music Lessons

Music lessons have commenced, and fees are now on Parent Pay. Please note that Singing lessons will not start again until after half term and the charge on Parent Pay reflects this planned absence.

We cannot stress enough that you should not be letting your child access ANY social media channels. For your reference the minimum age restrictions are given below.

You receive a fake email receipt/invoice that appears to be from the website you've purchased from or the payment service used to make your purchase. The email address domain doesn't match that of the genuine senders.
