
Then just before playtime we came together as a whole school in the playground and observed a minutes silence where we thought about all our happy memories of the Jubilee in June.



Class 1

We have had a fantastic first week in Class 1! We have been settling in and getting to know the new routines such as coming in straight to a morning starter activity and working in groups at tables in English and Maths. We have been learning to self assess our work using the traffic light colours. Green means we found the task easy, orange means it was ok but we needed a little help and red means it was difficult and we needed lots of help. We have still enjoyed some time exploring the different resources, toys and games in Class 1 and we have particularly enjoyed using our Grandpa Greene's cafe role play area as part of our Discovering Diggle topic.

In English we have written the names of the people in our family and have written sentences about ourselves.

In maths we have been completing our first pre- assessment on numbers and place value.

In PE we played some movement games, moving our bodies in different ways and in different directions. We particularly enjoyed the dinosaur egg hunt where we used a peg to collect dinosaur eggs (bean bags) from the nest.

Class 2

What a great start we have all had to our new class. We have been settling in, starting our new theme and getting to know all the adults working with us.

To begin our theme of 'Discovering Diggle' we started some artwork reflecting the colours of the fields and sky around us. We have been learning how to colour mix with powder paints to create shades of blue and green. We used these to paint the background for a picture which we will add more detail to next week. We also began some theme writing. We have been listening to different stories from the author Julia Donaldson. She is our featured author for the next few weeks. Our favourite so far has been 'Sharing a shell' about a little hermit crab who finds a shiny new shell and doesn't want to share it! We have also been working on our handwriting by focusing on the ladder letters I and i. Next week we will look at t, u, y and j. Some of them have a single straight line, like I and some are a little more complicated, like t.

We have also run the daily mile every day. We've had a busy but fun week!

Class 3

Class 3 have settled beautifully into the Juniors and have worked hard all week. We have started our new science unit on *Magnets* and have already learnt a lot from our investigations as well as producing a lovely cover page for our books. In theme, we have filled in our KWL sheet on what we already know about the *Ancient Egyptians* and what we would like to find out. We have also started our cover page in our Theme Book. In maths, we have revised some number bonds and times tables from Year 2 as well as completing our Pre-Topic Test on *Number and Place Value*. Class 4

Class 4 started our new science topic Living Things and their Habitats by considering which wild animals live in Saddleworth. We then used the iPads to find an image from which to sketch it into our books. In SMSC we started our VIPs unit by listing some examples of how to show respect to the important people in our lives. We wrote down everything we know about the Ancient Egyptians in our first theme topic of the year and in maths we have been revisiting our times tables, starting with the 2s, 5s and 10s before going onto trickier ones later in the week. For our English lessons, the children shared their amazing stories from their holidays, used adjectives to describe their family members and tried expanded noun phrases to create an interesting character description. A fantastic week!


Class 5


Class 6





4. Activities – Holiday Activities and Food will be available over the Summer for children aged 5-16 who are receiving free school meals. For younger children, download the 50 things to do before you're five app, and young people can check out local youth groups. Oldham's family information service includes support and activities for all children including additional needs.



5. Food — We don't want any Oldham child to go hungry. There is direct help such as <u>free school meals</u>, and you can also find your local <u>foodbank</u>. If you're pregnant or have a child under 4, you may be able to access vouchers from the NHS Healthy Start food and milk scheme.



 Financial help — If you've lost your job or are struggling with <u>rent</u>, <u>heating</u>, <u>debt</u> or <u>benefits</u> we can help. There are people to talk to so you're not alone.



7. Babies and pre-school – Parents and carers play the most important part
in helping their child's communication and talking in everyday life. Children learn
through daily life, play and reading together. Please try to reduce the time you
spend looking at your phone or tablet whilst with a baby or young child. How you look at, read
with, speak and react to the world with your child helps them to develop.

Check out the Greater Manchester <u>Top Ten Tips for Talking</u>, <u>50 Things To Do</u> Before You're Five, and Oldham's <u>Language Skills Guide</u>. Or for tips and videos about language and bonding see the excellent BBC Tiny Happy People.

ICAN also have great <u>resources for parents</u> including a guide to stages of language development and a poster to <u>check progress</u>. And for information about stammering, take a look at Stamma.

If your child attends an <u>early years setting</u>, have a chat with their key worker about your concerns. They are there to help and support your child and work together in partnership with families to develop an action plan using the <u>WellComm Toolkit</u>.

If your child does not attend a setting, or you have any concerns about your child's speech, language and communication development, you can also speak to Oldham's Right Start Team.



Primary school – As you child begins their journey through primary school they will continue
to develop their understanding of longer instructions and questions. They will use more complex
vocabulary, longer sentences and stories, develop more speech sounds and extend their
conversation skills. Take the opportunity to read together.

3. Secondary school – Language development in secondary years is more gradual. Your young person will use language to solve more complex problems and develop a wider vocabulary. They will explain more complex ideas and use language socially in a more sophisticated way. Your young person's form tutor or the school's SENCo will be able to discuss any concerns you have.

Bag Gate!

I recognise that decision on bags has caused some upset among parents. This decision was taken last term and communicated to parents at the welcome evenings in June or via email by your childs new class teacher if you were unable to attend. Perhaps if I explain in a little more detail the reasoning behind the decision parents will understand why the decision has been made. Rucksacks, especially large ones, sit very high on a peg and protrude out making it difficult for coats to then be hung over the top. This inevitably leads to the coats ending up all over the floor and they become a trip hazard for both children and adults.

We discussed this as a staff and came to the decision that from September we would ask that children do not bring these to school. Book bags, pump bags, flat shoulder bags and cloth bags/bags for life are all allowed. These all sit better on the peg.

Please can all parents support the schools new rules and send their child with a bag that is not a rucksack.

We have set up a premier League fantasy football league.

If your child would like to enter please sign up on the Premier League fantasy football website and create your team. Then email leanne.hazlehurst@diggleschool.co.uk to get the schools league code. Please make sure you read the terms and conditions and the rules. Once signed up you will also be entered into weekly and monthly competitions set by the premier League, not by school. Mrs Hazlehurst will set up a board at school that we will update weekly to see the current leaderboard etc. This could be a great opportunity for you to work with your child to

create a team together.

Forest School and PE

Now that we are able to get the school more or less back to normal and bubbles are hopefully a distant nightmare, we have made the decision to return to the children having half a term of Forest School with it taking place one afternoon a week. We are also asking that children do not come in their Forest School clothes but that they get changed into them at lunchtime.

Children getting changed in school once a week is helpful to prepare them for getting changed at swimming in Year 4 and 5 and is also a skill that is useful for High School. Also in the younger classes it is really useful for the staff to be able to access how the children manage this everyday skill.

We discussed as a staff whether we should go back to changing for PE, but felt that the benefits of ensuring a forty minute PE lesson is not cut short by the need to get changed should not be lost. Also in the current financial climate we did not want to go back to asking parents to buy trainers that stayed in school. Under the current system children can wear the same trainers for PE and at home.

As Forest School lasts a whole afternoon and they only have to get changed once this was a much better option. The children will come home on Forest School days in their Forest School clothes and will bring uniform home. Staff will strive to ensure that all children put uniform straight into their bags to return home. If you want to ensure your child's clothes return home please ensure the uniform is clearly labeled with their name.

Parents Evening and Open Days

Parents evenings will continue to be held online this year. This is one change that was forced by COVID that has proved to be a better solution. It allows parents to attend without the need to worry about child care. It also allows working parents to attend from their desk instead of having to run the gauntlet of rush hour traffic and it provides a totally private consultation. This terms date is in the *Dates for your Diary*, and teachers will contact you a few weeks before to make an appointment.

However, we know the one thing that the online approach does not give, is the opportunity to look at your children's books. Therefore going forward we are going to incorporate this into our Open Days, This will mean that you will have the opportunity to look at your child's work three times in the year rather than just twice.

For those of you new to the school, our *Open Days* are an opportunity for parents/guardians/grandparents to come into school and spend an hour in the classroom with their child completing an activity which changes each open day.

To incorporate the book viewing, Open days will now run slightly longer. If you attend a morning session you will be able to visit your child in class from 9-10 and then from 10-10:30 books will be available in the hall along with refreshments. If you are attending the afternoon session you will view books 1:30 -2 and then go into classes 2-3.

If your child attends BASC and you can not get to an Open Day your books will be in BASC after school on Open days.

Tickets for School Performances

We are hoping that this Christmas we will be able to go back to not only the Reception Nativity and the Year 1/2 performance but also the KS2 Christingle. Tickets will go on sale via Parent Pay nearer the time, so please new parents, please ensure you activate your Parent Pay account.

The Key Stage 2 Christingle involves all the children in years 3,4,5 and 6. Because of this we are only able to offer one ticket per family for this performance. If you have two children in KS2 you will still only receive the one ticket. Unfortunately we are restricted due to capacity at the church.

Reception and Key Stage One are offered 3 tickets per family for their performances (in total not for each performance). Year 3 and 4 will get the same for their Easter Performance and Year 5 and 6 for their summer production.

There will also be a music performance by some of the children receiving lessons in school and taking part in the music groups available. Due to the numbers of children involved are are not sure how this will work yet, but more details will be available nearer the time.

I am hoping that by making this clear very early on we can avoid disappointment and parents can plan. The dates for the Christmas activities are on the Dates For Your Diary above. Please can I ask that parents do not get cross and upset with the office staff over ticket allocations. They are just following the rules above, dictated by safe capacity limits.
